Police procure vehicles for polls

KAMPALA. As February 18, polls day draw near, police have procured equipment that will be used during and after the polls.

The procured gadgets include ammunition, 1,600 motorcycles, 85 patrol trucks, 49 fire extinguishing vehicles and six Armoured personnel carriers.

Mr Fred Enanga, the police spokesperson said the motorcycles are to be given to anti-riot personnel, who will work with the 27 mobile intelligence teams that have been established in every policing region.

"The motorcycles are going to be given to anti-riot and crime intelligence officers. They are going to work with other police departments to ensure safety during and after polls," Mr Enanga said while addressing the press conference yesterday.

He added that the patrol vehicles bought would replace the old ones and shall be used to ensure quick and effective re-

sponse in case of peace threats.

"We are going to supply the Fire Brigades to various municipalities, especially those that are prone to fires. We have already deployed security personnel to ensure peace during and after elections days," said Mr Enanga.

The ammunition

On the number of guns bought for policing during the polls, the police publicist said it was a confidential matter that could not be revealed to the media. Last week, a local newspaper reported that police had procured guns worth Shs6 in preparation for polls. Asked whether police

were anticipating chaos during elections, something that could have prompted them to purchase new ammunitions, Mr Enanga said: "We have always bought equipment for our force and this is not different from the normal procedures we follow. We had already budgeted for them."

Five ambulances have also been purchased and will patrol the highways and places where political tension is high.

Last Wednesday, Mr Rainers Harms, a forensic expert from German, handed over 88 cameras to police which Mr Andrew Sorowen the director of special duties at the UPF, said were going to be used to film and photograph rioters so that prime suspects can easily be identified.
