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KAMPALA. Kyambogo University has confirmed cancelling the results of more than 1,000 students over forged examination permits in the ongoing end of semester examinations.

The university Vice Chancellor, Prof Eli Katunguka, at a press conference yesterday said the affected students accessed the examination rooms when they had not paid their tuition.

"We have realised that about 20 per cent of the continuing students had not paid their tuition but they accessed the exams. I want to inform those students that their results will be cancelled and some may face prosecution for presenting forged documents," Prof Katunguka said.

"When we have a complete list of the affected students, we shall publish this list in the [news]papers so that their parents and guardians know that their students are not progressing normally," he added.

The examinations, which are still ongoing end on December 10, with the new semester slated for January 6.

The university will also graduate more than 7,000 students during its 14th graduation ceremony to take place next week from December 13 to 15.

Two hundred and three students will be awarded with First Class honours in various disciplines. The best student in Science is Mr Derick Kakooza with CGPA of 4.90, and the best in Humanities is Mr Samson Kyoziira Zedekis with CGPA of 4.83.

Meals.

Prof Katunguka said they will outsource catering services to private restaurants where students should be able to buy food.

"The university has been feeding more than 8,500 students on government sponsorship but starting next year, we are going to provide them with their allowances on time so that they can be able to buy food at their own convenience," he said.

Prof Katunguka also highlighted the list of unfunded priorities amounting to Shs50.65 billion including salary enhancement, replacing the outdated sewage systems, salary arrears for non-teaching staff, underpaid terminal benefits, domestic arrears, among others.

"At this year's graduation and for the first time in history, we will have transcripts and certificates of the graduating students ready so they can collect them on either the day of the graduation or after a week," Prof
