

Regional experts seek markets in cotton, textile industry

Experts will work with the local cotton and textile industry at the second East African Business and entrepreneurship conference from September 26 to 28, Dorothy Nakaweesi writes.

Cotton production, processing and trade of both raw and processed products is highly influenced by policies of major producing countries, through price support, tariff protection, production subsidies and stock piling that destabilise prices. The competitiveness of cotton industry in East African Community (EAC) is faced by challenges such as low yields, ginning overcapacity, low ginning out-turn ratio and inefficient value addition.

Ms Lilian Awinja, the chief executive officer of East African Business Council (EABC) says: "Value addition in cotton and textile industry into innovative aesthetic accessories, interior designs and fashion can create more jobs in the region. But only 15 per cent of EAC cotton is processed locally, while 85 per cent is exported in form of lint to other

countries."

To develop this industry to cut back on the import bill, experts in this sector hope to work with the local cotton and textile industry at the second East African Business and Entrepreneurship Conference & Exhibition in Dar es Salaam Tanzania.

Expectations

According to Ms Awinja, the regional experts are expected to develop with plans and policies to promote the sector

performance, productivity and quality.

"It is a high time that EAC countries embarked on manufacturing apparels such as inner garments, ties, scurfs that require low level technology and skills as the region works on a phase-out approach of imported second-hand clothes," Ms Awinja noted.

She said there is a huge opportunity for the African fashion and design industry, to be in the spotlight on the interna-

tional market.

Furthermore, the East African Diaspora will be strongly engaged to amplify investment into the region. The simultaneous exhibition will give participants the possibility to present themselves and serve as points of contact for their organisations and businesses.
